## USEFUL INFORMATION REGARDING THE MEDICAL SERVICES ON SITE AT WAKESTOCK

I have an existing medical condition, do I need to tell anyone when I arrive at the festival?

In the majority of cases we would say no, you do not need to make us aware providing you either wear a piece of SOS jewellery or carry a card in your wallet with the details of your complaint, how to treat it and who to contact in case of emergency. If your condition will stop you communicating this information if you have an attack then we would request you go and say hello to the medical staff and have a quick chat about your condition.

I suffer from anaphylaxis / epilepsy. Can I store my medication with you?

We strongly recommend that you keep these medications with you at all times

Why is it important to keep fluid levels (not alcohol) up?

If you don't it's simple, you will feel like pants and get a severe hangover. We recommend for every alcoholic drink, drink ½ pint of water, it is important to drink water over the course of the day as well especially if the weather is hot.

Disclosure of drugs or alcohol to the medics?

If you have taken drugs or excess alcohol and end up needing medical treatment for a related or non related reason please tell the medics. They are bound to privacy and will not share this information with anyone. This information is very important to your treatment plan and may result in longer treatment times in the hospital if not disclosed

Is there anywhere on site I can get contraceptives?

Please go and see the staff in the welfare tent in the campsite who will be able to help you – they have stock of free condoms and free emergency contraception if needed on site.

How do I recognise a medic?

All the medics on site will be in uniform and will sometimes wear high vis as well. All will have either a Medic 1 logo or Welsh Ambulance Service Logo on. The staff from the Welfare tent are easily recognisable as all will be wearing green vests.

If I have to go to hospital will you bring me back?

Unfortunately we are unable to offer this service. If you are taken to hospital in an ambulance the ambulance will be unable to return you to site. We recommend you tell a friend where you are going so that you can get a lift back, or arrange for your parents or relatives to collect you from hospital to take you home.
